UPDATE

THE P.W. LITCHFIELD HERITAGE CENTER

In last spring's *Litchfield Legends*, the Litchfield Park Historical Society (LPHS) announced plans to move our museum to the Litchfield/Denny historic house on old Litchfield Hill (The 21-acre hilltop was part of the much larger *Rancho La Loma* which included surrounding property to the north, west, and south all the way to Camelback Road. It was once owned by the Litchfield family and their descendants). These plans have been worked on since 2018 and required a Business Plan along with approval from the City of Litchfield Park. Following a rigorous RFP process, *Orcutt/Winslow Architectural Firm* and *Waltz Construction* were hired to execute the project. The estimated cost to repurpose the structure into a public facility with a driveway and parking lot was 3.5 million dollars.

In June the Capital Campaign Committee began its work of soliciting funds to complete this project. To date, we are proud to announce that we have received **2.1** million dollars in cash and pledges with **1.4** million dollars yet to raise. In addition, **17** Naming Opportunities have been secured with 15 left open. Most of the 52

donors to this project have been individuals – 60% from Litchfield Park and 40% from other areas. Of that 40%, more than half have been from out of state. This response positions the future Heritage Center to become an important destination for tourists visiting the Valley of the Sun.

One of our more recent donors has been the Litchfield Park Kiwanis Club. Knowing the high value experiences the Heritage Center collections will have for area school children, the Kiwanis have given generously to this project in the form of one of their Legacy Grants. These grants are rarely given and are significant in their dollar amounts. With this gift come Naming Rights in the new Heritage Center. The club annually supports projects that

NEW IN THE GIFT SHOP

We have some exciting new items that have been added to our collection for you.

Navajo Carvings: Our newly added whimsical animal carvings are created by the members of the Navajo reservation in Arizona. The pieces were purchased through a representative from an outpost on the Navajo Reservation. Each carving is very colorful and unique and includes the name of the artist. We are excited to bring these special hand-crafted carvings to you.



Oaxacan Wood Carvings: The Oaxacan carvings are one of our best sellers. We have recently added some new animals to our collection. The carvings are made in Oaxaca, Mexico. The wood comes from the copal tree, the fresh cut wood is soft and workable; it has a small heart, so it does not split. It can be sanded smooth to an almost porcelain-like finish to allow the artist a perfect surface for fine details. Often, the whole family is involved in the creation process. The men carve, children and the elderly



sand and the women paint the figurines. The family name is painted on the bottom of each piece.

Horse Hair Pottery:

The ancient Indian tribes made this pottery to honor a favorite **horse** or to celebrate the birth of a horse. It is said that this pottery was first created when a long-haired maiden was removing hot pottery from her kiln and the wind blew her hair onto the hot pot and burned the **hair** into the pottery.

The fine dark lines in this pottery are created using horsehair. This is done by throwing horse hair onto the **pottery** when it reaches about 1600 degrees during firing. The horsehair burns when it touches the hot **pottery** leaving a carbon stain cooked into it, making a beautiful and unique one of kind piece.

Please stop by to see these one of a kind items in addition to our extensive collection of books focused on the history and culture of the Southwest. We also have some fabulous jewelry that contains Arizona mined copper. All the bracelets and earrings are designed and created in Bisbee Arizona.

This is a great way to support the Litchfield Park Historical Society and Museum, enjoy the evening with friends and then on Saturday view the wonderful homes of Litchfield Park!







*A Short History of the Incredible Women's Suffrage Movement Tuesday, March 31 at 10:00 a.m.

The Church at Litchfield Park, Souers Hall, 300 N. Old Litchfield Rd

Change in the status of women began with new ideas about the civil and human rights of individuals. Debbie Hanson with the Questers organization will discuss the thinkers who formulated new concepts of the role of women and how those ideas influenced changes in women's roles and lives.

*Women's Suffrage: The West Led the Way Wednesday, April 1 at 6:30 p.m.

Joye Kohl with the Questers organization will examine the role of all western states, the state of Kansas and the territory of Alaska in leading the nation with the passage of women's suffrage prior to 1915. This presentation further explores the role the West played in supporting the struggle of other women working for the right to vote through a constitutional amendment.

The Litchfield Park Historical Society Museum will host Hands-On History Day, a free, educational event highlighting local history with hands-on activities, demonstrations, and informational displays from 10 a.m. - 4 p.m. at the museum. Explore what life was like during the early decades of the 20th century. The museum will also be open for visitors to view its most recent exhibits, *Stagecoaches to Spacecraft: The Story of Goodyear and Avondale* and *The Spanish Flu of 1918: A Pandemic's Local Legacy*.

*The Antiquity of Irrigation in the Southwest

Tuesday, April 28 at 10:00 a.m. and Wednesday, April 29 at 6:30 p.m.

Before AD 1500, Native American cultures took advantage of southern Arizona's long growing season and tackled its challenge of limited precipitation by developing the earliest and most extensive irrigation works in all of North America. Agriculture was introduced to Arizona more than 4,000 years before present, and irrigation systems were developed in our state at least 3,500 years ago – several hundred years before irrigation was established in ancient Mexico. This Arizona Humanities "AZ Speaks" program presented by archaeologist Allen Dart will provide an overview of ancient irrigation systems in the southern Southwest and discuss irrigation's implications for understanding social complexity.

*The History of Luke Air Force Base in the Southwest Valley Tuesday, May 19 at 10:00 a.m.

The Church at Litchfield Park, Souers Hall, 300 N. Old Litchfield Rd

Considered one of the most important military bases during World War II, Luke Air Force Base is currently home to the world's largest fighter wing. Join Luke Air Force Base historian, Rick Griset, as he discusses the history of the base in the Southwest Valley. Rick is the author of the new Images in America book *Luke Air Force Base*.


